Looking back over the 150th anniversary year of the Little Sisters' arrival in Baltimore, several Little Sisters share their reflections:

- "Throughout the entire year, I became more deeply aware of the courage and love of our first Little Sisters who left everything to serve God and the elderly in the United States. Had they not answered God's call, perhaps we would not be Little Sisters ourselves today. Now it is our turn to be strong and holy links in this unbroken chain of humble service to the elderly so that we may transmit this flame which burned so brightly in the hearts of our founding Little Sisters to the Little Sisters of tomorrow."
- "St. Jeanne Jugan was able to bid farewell herself to the first Little Sister

missionaries to North America and prayed for the success of their mission. They faced the same hardships she experienced in order to launch this work of charity with the elderly on foreign shores. Celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Arrival of the Little Sisters of the Poor in Baltimore

One hundred and fifty years ago, women filled with love and devotion made a voyage to America across that frightening blue ocean, Carrying God's precious cargo.

The Sisters were praying and singing praising God almighty for this wonderful new beginning.

Finding a place to call their own,
each one having a chore —
Laundry, cooking, and cleaning, and Lord there was so much more.

The sick and elderly and homeless joined the Sisters there within, as a strong need, for all to feed, Now the begging would begin.

And one by one the people came; the handicapped, hopeful, despised, and lame.

Over the years, faith, hope and tears kept them all together. Caring for the ill, doing God's will, conquered the stormy weather.

By and by they settled in a home that all would adore. So "Thanks be to God" for everything, and for the Little Sisters of the Poor. That your legacy will go on and on, We pray to you Saint Jeanne Jugan.

Mary Elizabeth Olin, an assisted living Resident, said a special highlight of our 150th anniversary celebration was the opportunity to learn more about the history of Little Sisters and St. Martin's Home. She even used the information during a weekly activity, "The Reading Circle," which she conducts for the Residents. Mary Elizabeth said she started her first discussion with the opening of the Brooklyn home and took the Residents on the same journey the Little Sisters followed as they opened their Homes in the United States.

The Apostolic Nuncio's visit was especially meaningful for Mary Elizabeth, who said the Mass was impressive and beautifully celebrated. Mary Elizabeth said it was so meaningful that Archbishop Christophe Pierre, Apostolic Nuncio, was born in the same area as Jeanne Jugan! Resident Jerry Lynch had the same feeling, saying the Nuncio was "gracious to all the Residents." Jerry also commented that it was impressive to see the priests and seminarians from the archdiocese who supported the opening of the 150th celebration.

Jerry and Mary Elizabeth both had strong childhood connections to the Little Sisters. Jerry remembers Valley

raised her family in Belair, MD and worked as a lab technician at Mercy Hospital.

Before coming to St. Martin's, Angie said she had nothing, and during the time she waited to move here, she appreciated the social worker who assisted her in so many ways (that social worker is now a Little Sister of the Poor, Sister Angela Marie Clare).

Angie has been writing poems since she was a child. In elementary school a teacher assigned the task of writing a poem for Christmas. The next day Angie was asked to read her poem but the teacher gave her a failing grade because she thought Angie could not have written the poem without help. The teacher never relented and never apologized, but Angie never stopped writing poetry. She now writes a poem each month for the Resident newspaper, "The Bell Ringer," and for all the special occasions at the Home.

When asked how she does it, she humbly replies, "It's a gift that God has given me. God guides the pen and I feel the words in my heart." As St. Jeanne Jugan might say, "Thanks be to God, Angie. Blessed be God!"

Street's large chapel. As an altar boy from St. John the Evangelist Church on Valley Street, he attended May Crowning Masses and remembers the Little Sisters wearing their now outdated habits. Mary Elizabeth recalled the Little Sisters as kind and loving. She knew them as a child living on York Road and recalled the Little Sisters as they went "begging" from house to house for collections, the start of their parish collections that the Sisters now make weekly.

was a fascinating experience. After the molten metal was poured into the mold and allowed to cool and harden, the mold was broken, never to be used again. This bell, then, was unique. Blessed on August 30, the feast of St. Jeanne Jugan, the bell was rung in turn by each Little Sister. The ringing of a bell has often been used as a call to prayer; that is why I think the inscription on ours could not be more appropriate. It is the text of the advice St. Jeanne Jugan gave to one of the Sisters: 'Jesus is waiting for you in the chapel. Say to him, 'Jesus, you know exactly what is going on. You are all I have, and you know all things. Come to my help.' And then go, and don't worry about how you are going to manage. That you have told God about it is enough. He has a good memory.' As each Little Sister rang the bell, each in a different manner, unique as the bell itself, I couldn't help but hear in as many different ways the words of St. Jeanne Jugan inscribed on the bell, 'Jesus is waiting for you in the chapel... Jesus is waiting for you in the chapel.'

The presence of a young Little Sister from Baltimore who pronounced her first vows last year, accompanied by her parents and relatives, made the day even more significant. St. Jeanne Jugan is alive in Baltimore today!"
